Dear Secretary McIlwain, Ms. Conklin, and Ms. Burke:

Thank you for your service and commitment to advancing environmental justice in the State of Maryland. The progress Maryland has made in advancing Environmental Justice (EJ) at the state level is incredibly relevant and important— progress such as establishing definitions of "overburdened" and "underserved" communities, establishing the Commission on Environmental Justice and Sustainable Communities (CEJSC), requiring some permit applicants to submit an Environmental Justice (EJ) score, and Governor Moore's new executive order creating the Interagency Environmental Justice & Equity Council and annual agency EJ reports. We aspire to further this progress with our recommendations.

As federal protections are dismantled, it's more important than ever to fight to protect the health and safety of all people, especially those in marginalized communities who often bear the brunt of toxic exposure and other types of environmental injustice. We are hopeful that Maryland will continue to lead and set a strong example for other states to follow.

We are writing to request that the Governor's office, MDE, and CEJSC build on these initiatives to ensure EJ considerations are centered in decision-making and EJ policies are robustly enforced. Please accept our recommendations below for developing procedures to establish further EJ accountability and community engagement.

- 1. Support efforts to address cumulative health impacts in environmental permitting, as outlined in the CHERISH Our Communities Act (Cumulative Harms to Environmental Restoration for Improving our Shared Health) and increase transparency for how cumulative health impacts are addressed (e.g., a public dashboard that tracks impact assessments or quarterly public, plain-language progress reports). We encourage both the interagency council and the commission to endorse and actively support the CHERISH Our Communities Act when it is reintroduced in 2026.
- 2. Ensure accessibility to EJ resources by revitalizing the <u>MDE EJ webpage</u> to include updated information on EJ legislation and executive orders, accessible databases that identify EJ communities and their risks, and links to EJ progress reports. This information should be in plain-language to ensure accessibility to the general public.
- 3. Include a recommendation in the CEJSC annual report to build accountability into EJ and Justice 40 implementation across programs. While the state has begun to include funding requirements for overburdened and underserved communities in legislation, implementation is inconsistent. The disappointing allocation of Greenspace Equity Funds in 2025 is one example.
- 4. Use the two public meetings of the interagency council to intentionally and thoughtfully seek input from frontline communities on the EJ concerns they find most pressing. If these meetings have numerous concerned community members, the interagency council should work to schedule additional time or dates for public input.
- 5. Provide a briefing to the Baltimore Just Transition Network and Mid Atlantic Justice Coalition on implementation of the new MDE EnviroScreen mapping tool and plans for implementation of the new Executive Order, and incorporate a public comment process for feedback.

6. Fulfill the directive in the Climate Solutions Now Act to "set appropriate goals for the percentage of state funding for greenhouse gas emission reduction measures that should be used for the benefit of disproportionately affected communities" by recommending at least 40% by 2026.

We, the undersigned organizations and concerned citizens, are eager to hear how the state will take into consideration our recommendations and proceed with enacting and enforcing Maryland's commitment to environmental justice.
